SOUTHERN VIEW POLICE DEPARTMENT NEWS

Officer Sam Gool and Sangamon County Deputy Derek Miller responded to a house fire in the village at 401 Kern Street on Saturday, June 10 at approximately 11:08 p.m. Their quick response and use of fire extinguishers allowed them to extinguish the fire prior to the Springfield Fire Department's arrival and kept the damage to a minimum.

Officer Nick Clatfelter made an outstanding traffic stop on a van driving without headlights. The traffic stop resulted in a DUI arrest and the arrest of four adults for possession of a large amount of illegal contraband and drug paraphernalia found inside the van.

Southern View Police Chief Mike Moore recently was 'arrested' in participation with the local Muscular Dystrophy campaign held at the Route 66 Hotel & Conference Center in Southern View. Chief Moore was able to donate over \$600 to the campaign. Thanks to all residents, businesses and friends who helped the Chief collect his bail money.

Residents will be seeing new faces in the village patrol cars. Full-time Officer Travis Gilbert is now on patrol and has been assigned to work the midnight shift on weekends and second shift on Sunday and Mondays. Part-time Officers Lamar Cole and Joshua Bergfeld are currently completing law update material. Once this training is complete, they will be assigned to work weekend day and second shifts in conjunction with our other part-time officers.

Independence Day Celebration will be held in the community park at 9:00 a.m. on Tuesday, July 4, 2006. Plan on

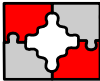

NEW APPOINTMENTS

Resident Janet Williamson has been appointed Village Clerk. Janet will be available at the village office from noon to 5:00 p.m. weekdays. We have redefined the position of Village Treasurer and resident Hilda Mangiaracina has been appointed to that position. Hilda will be working with our newly appointed CPA firm, Estes, Bridgewater & Ogden to handle our daily and monthly financial needs. The firm of Perrino & Associates have been appointed to the position of auditor for this fiscal year.

We are in the process of hiring a full time public works employee and hope to have a decision by mid-July.

INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT

The agreement for animal control services with Sangamon County has been finalized. The county will only respond to inquiries from village officials so residents must first contact village hall if there are complaints or concerns.

Southern View Parks Motorized Policy

Motorized vehicles of any kind (cars, trucks, motorcycles, scooters, bikes, etc.) are prohibited in the parks unless use is for official purposes or unless the Park Committee grants special permission. This prohibition includes anything that is not human powered that is designed to carry people. The one exception is motorized wheelchairs – they are always permitted. Motorized toys are permitted in the parks providing they are kept at least 50 feet from all paths, sidewalks, and pavilions and noise does not disrupt or disturb other park patrons.

Building Permits Are Required

If you are planning any construction, such as fences, siding, roofs, decks, porches, room additions or other structural construction, please contact the Village office at 529-3352 or Trustee Martha Kurtz at 522-1805 to receive your application. Please note permits for demolition are also required. If you are unsure if you need a permit, please inquire. Work cannot begin until your permit has been approved.

Limb Pick-up Policy

The Public Works department picks up limbs on the 1st Monday of each month. Please put your limbs out the weekend before scheduled pickups. In the event of severe storms, the crews will be out as needed.

The following are allowed and will be picked up:

Limbs or branches no larger than 6 ft in length and 4 inches in diameter & cut into manageable size that have fallen or that have been trimmed as part of regular maintenance.

The following are NOT allowed and will NOT be picked up:

Anything cut or trimmed as a result of tree removal. It is the responsibility of each resident and/or tree service to dispose of debris. Any limb that is larger than 6 feet and/or larger than 4 inches in diameter. Stumps, shrubs, flowers, garden waste or grass clippings are not allowed. Arrange pickup with your waste disposal company. Contact Trustee Petrosky if you have further questions.

Animal Control

§ 92.01 DEFINITIONS. For the purpose of this chapter, the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning.

AT LARGE. As applied to dogs shall be held to mean such as are not confined or restrained by means of a secure enclosure or leash.

DOG. A female as well as a male dog. (1979 Code, § 6-11)

§ 92.02 RUNNING AT LARGE PROHIBITED. No dog shall be permitted by the owner or keeper thereof to run at large in the village. Any dog kept in the village shall have received rabies vaccination during the current calendar year and shall have about its neck a collar with a tag attached evidencing such vaccination. (1979 Code, § 6-1)

§ 92.03 VACCINATIONS. (A) Required, who may vaccinate. Vaccination of dogs, as required by this chapter, shall be performed by a veterinarian duly licensed to practice his or her profession in this state. Upon performing such vaccination, such veterinarian shall issue to the owner or keeper a metallic or other suitable tag to be attached to the collar of such dog. (1979 Code, § 6-2)

(B) Duration of vaccination. The vaccination performed under the provisions of this chapter shall be effective until the expiration of the calendar year in which the vaccination was performed. (1979 Code, § 6-3)

(C) Exhibition of certificate. At a reasonable time upon request of the village officials or any person designated by them, the owner or keeper of any dog shall exhibit his or her certificate issued under the provisions of this chapter showing the vaccination of any dog owned or controlled by him or her. (1979 Code, § 6-4)

§ 92.04 IMPOUNDMENT. (A) General. It shall be the duty of the village officials or any person designated by them to take up and impound in the County Animal Shelter any dog found running at large in the village contrary to the provisions of this chapter, and the owner or keeper of such dog shall immediately be given notice by mail of such impounding, if ownership of the dog can be established. (1979 Code, § 6-5)

(B) Redemption of impounded dogs. Any dog impounded, except such as may have bitten a person, shall unless sooner redeemed be held for a period of seven days in order to afford opportunity to the owner or keeper thereof to redeem the same. Any such owner or keeper desiring to redeem his or her impounded dog shall pay an impounding fee of \$100 for the first offense, \$150 for the second offense and \$200 for the third and all offenses thereafter to the Village Clerk, who shall issue a receipt therefor. No dog shall be released from the dog pound unless the owner or keeper exhibits such receipt to the pound officer and also pays the cost of keeping such dog while impounded. No dog shall be released without having been vaccinated for the current calendar year. (1979 Code, § 6-6)

(C) Destruction of impounded dogs. Any impounded dog which shall not be redeemed within seven days, as provided in division (A) of this section, shall be humanely destroyed by the poundkeeper. (1979 Code, § 6-7) (Am. Ord. 01-02-02, passed 2-12-2001)

§ 92.05 BITING DOGS, PROCEDURES FOR IMPOUNDMENT, DESTRUCTION. (A) Any dog which shall have bitten or otherwise injured any person so as to cause an abrasion of the skin shall be immediately taken up, impounded and kept separated from other dogs for 14 days. If during that period such dog develops symptoms of illness, a veterinarian shall be called to diagnose its condition. If the symptoms disclosed are such as to indicate the presence of rabies, such dog shall be destroyed, in such manner, however, as to preserve intact the head, which shall thereupon be detached and immediately sent to the diagnostic laboratory of the State Department of Agriculture. In case such dog cannot be safely taken up and impounded it may be shot, care being taken to preserve the head intact, which shall thereupon be immediately detached and be delivered to the diagnostic laboratory of the State Department of Agriculture.

(B) If at the expiration of the period of 14 days no symptoms of rabies have developed in such dog so impounded, the same may be redeemed by the owner upon payment of the redemption fees and charges specified by this chapter; provided, however, that in case any dog so impounded for biting a person shall have previously bitten any person, such shall be humanely destroyed by the poundkeeper. (1979 Code, § 6-8)

§ 92.06 DESTRUCTIVE DOGS.

Any dog which may in any manner disturb the quiet of any person or neighbor or shall destroy or in any manner injure any animal, plant, shrub or other property not on the premises of its owner or keeper is declared to be a nuisance, and such dog shall be taken up and impounded and may be redeemed or destroyed in the manner provided by this chapter. (1979 Code, § 6-9)

§ 92.07 POUNDKEEPER DESIGNATED. Except as to the regulations concerning vaccination, the Trustee of Public Health shall be, and he or she is charged with the duty of enforcing the provisions of this chapter. He or she shall be ex officio poundkeeper of the village. He or she shall designate such officers and employees under his or her supervision as may be necessary to enforce the provisions of this chapter. (1979 Code, § 6-10)

§ 92.08 ENFORCEMENT.

The Trustees of Public Health or officers under his or her supervision shall have police powers in the enforcement of this chapter, and no person shall interfere with, hinder, molest or abuse any of the above stated officers in the exercise of such powers. (1979 Code, § 6-13)

§ 92.99 PENALTY.

Any violation of this chapter shall be punishable by a fine pursuant to § 10.99. Each day that any violation of this chapter shall continue shall constitute a separate offense. (1979 Code, § 6-12)

For residents interested in having swimming pools in their yards:

§ 90.01 DEFINITION. A private residential swimming pool is defined as any receptacle or containment for water or any artificial pool of water having a depth of more than 24 inches in any area of more than 25 square feet or containing or being capable of containing more than 200 gallons of water intended for the purpose of immersion of persons and including all appurtenant equipment constructed, installed and maintained in or above the ground outside of a building used for a dwelling unit. (1979 Code, § 12-66)

§ 90.02 FENCE REQUIREMENTS. All outdoor private residential swimming pools, except those pools having walls extending four feet high or higher above ground level, shall be completely enclosed by a fence and shall be secure from trespass. All fence openings or points of entry or exit to or from the pool area enclosure shall be equipped with a gate. The fence and gate shall be 36 inches or more in height above the ground grade level. All gates shall be equipped with a self-closing or self-latching device placed at the top of the gate. (1979 Code, § 12-67)

§ 90.03 LADDER REQUIREMENT. All private residential swimming pools extending above the ground grade level shall have means of egress in the form of one or more ladders or set of steps, which shall be removed when the pool is not in use. (1979 Code, § 12-68)

§ 90.04 COMPLIANCE WITH PROVISIONS. It shall be unlawful to construct, maintain, install or enlarge any private residential swimming pool in the village, except in compliance with the provisions of this chapter. (1979 Code, § 12-69) Penalty, see § 10.99

Residents are reminded there is an ordinance regarding weeds. It is also the resident's responsibility to keep the ditches and right ways around their homes free from weeds and other debris

§ 94.07 WEEDS.

Declared a nuisance. Any weeds such as jimson, burdock, ragweed, thistle, cocklebur or other weeds of a like kind found growing in any lot or tract of land in the village are declared to be a nuisance, and it shall be unlawful to permit any such weeds to grow or remain in any such place.

(A) Height. It shall be unlawful for anyone to permit any weeds, grass or plants other than trees, bushes, flowers, edible food plants or other ornamental plants to grow to a height exceeding eight inches anywhere in the village; any such plants or weeds exceeding such height are declared to be a nuisance.

(B) Removal; notice. It shall be the duty of the Health Officer to serve or cause to be served a notice upon the owner or occupant of any premises on which weeds or plants are permitted to grow in violation of the provisions of this chapter and to demand the abatement of the nuisance within ten days.

(C) Abatement. If the person so served does not abate the nuisance within ten days, the Health Officer may proceed to abate such nuisance, keeping an account of the expense of the abatement, and such expense shall be charged and paid by such owner or occupant. (1979 Code, § 12-8)
